

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#### <u>1. Short report about the activity of the Symposium for Multiple Sclerosis (SMS) under the</u> <u>Danube Symposium for Neurological Sciences</u> (by Professor László Vécsei and Anett Járdánházy)

We would like to inform you about the activity of the Symposium for Multiple Sclerosis (SMS) under the Danube Symposium for Neurological Sciences. The first step is to organise survey at national levels related to (1) MS Registry in different countries (altogether around 100 million people). We have sent questionnaires to the MS centers in the participating countries, and we are happy to inform you that we have already received back the majority of the completed questionnaires. Thereafter, it is suggested to publish these regional data. The next two steps will be the (2) MRI imaging and (3) CSF analysis and special molecular biomarkers surveys. Furthermore, it would be important to collaborate with each other in the future.

# **2. The Department Visit Program of the WFN** (by Professor Wolfgang Grisold, Secretary General of the WFN)

In addition to the WFN Teaching Centres (https://wfneurology.org/activities/education/neurologicaldepartment-visits) which are located in Africa (Rabat, Cairo, Senegal, Cape town) and Mexico, the WFN has also inspired a successful Department Visit program. The purpose is to enable young neurologists from low and lower-middle-income countries to stay up to 6 weeks in a department in Europe or Canada. These short visits help to understand different health systems, structures, therapies and above all create contacts and communication between the visitors and the hosts. The invitation to a Department Visit is officially announced on the WFN website, and applications are invited. A committee composed of the WFN Education committee, the African Academy of Neurology/the Pan American Federation of Neurological Societies and the hosting society independently look at the application and select a suitable candidate. The process of announcing and inviting is done by the WFN.

The first country to participate was Turkey and has strongly continued to do so. Other European countries who have participated are Austria, Germany, Italy, and Norway. For Latin American applicants and African applicants, the Department of Neurology at the Montreal Neurologic Institute volunteered.

What are the duties of the host country?

The national neurological society decides to participate in the department visit program. The suitable academic sites will be determined by the host country. It may be an advantage, that many of the Danube State member countries do already have English speaking university training. The hosts also supply the WFN with a short description in which training centre the visit will be, and what specialties can be found.

The Department Visit program is upon invitation of the hosting country's society, who covers also the costs. From the experience of the past years, travel would be between 2500-3000 \$, accommodation should be at the student home level, and most meals can be taken usually in the hospital facility. A small bursary for breakfast, food, and drinks are suggested. An insurance for the duration of the stay needs to be booked. In most parts of Europe, the costs were between 4000-6000 E.

The hosting department will communicate and explain the local and national health system, allow experience in outpatient, inpatient, emergency, and neurointensive care, as well as rehabilitation. The local technologies and procedures should be explained and available to the visitor. Communication is important and an English-Speaking tutor will be helpful.

Usually, the WFN visitors are allowed to give a short lecture on their own country, university, and the local need, which is very informative for the host country.

Once the visit is over, the candidate needs to write a report to the WFN and is encouraged to send a short report to World neurology. Presently there are several reports in the past issues of WN, which can be found at the following link: https://worldneurologyonline.com/?s=department+visit.

### Summary of WFN and IGAP to date

One of the many important roles that the World Federation of Neurology (WFN) has had in its sixty-five year history, is the involvement with neurological activities at the World Health Organisation (WHO) in WFN 's official capacity as a Non-State Actor in official relations with the WHO. This status provides WFN with opportunities to contribute to the development of international classifications, policies and action plans.

On November 12, 2020, the WHO Executive Board accepted the recommendation of the World Health Assembly (WHA) to adopt Resolution WHA73.10. This Resolution called for the development of an Intersectoral Global Action Plan (IGAP) to tackle epilepsy and other neurological disorders through comprehensive actions to detect, prevent, care, treat and rehabilitate people with epilepsy and other neurological disorders, as well as ensuring their social, economic, educational and inclusion needs. The WFN with the ILAE played a key role at the WHA and EB meetings in November 2020 and January 2021.

The Resolution (WHA73.10) to develop an IGAP is significant in that neurological disorders are openly recognized by the WHO Member States in line with the Global Burden of Neurological Disorders (2018) finding of them being the leading cause of disability-adjusted-life-years and the second leading cause of death.

The first stage after the Resolution was the WHO's circulation of a discussion paper. The WFN presented its comments on the discussion paper during virtual and web-based consultations and with several neurologists from both within WFN and from other Global Neurology Alliance (GNA) partners proposed amendments for IGAP.

WFN comments to the paper were submitted to the WHO in writing. The WHO then developed the first draft of the IGAP based on the input received on the discussion paper. This document outlines the scope, vision, goal and strategic objectives as well as specific actions for Member States, the WHO Secretariat and international and national partners.

Further consultation on this first draft document began during July 2021 and WFN contributed two submissions; one with the ILAE and ICNA and one with key members of the GNA. The outcomes of the consultations will now function as input for the WHO Secretariat to prepare a revised draft of the Intersectoral Global Action Plan on Epilepsy and other Neurological Disorders that will be submitted for review at the 150th session of the Executive Board in May 2022.

### <u>4. Letter from Morris Freedman MD, FRCPC, FAAN on behalf of the WFN eLearning Working</u> <u>Group</u>

Dear Dr Vecsei,

Kimberly Karlshoej suggested that we contact you on behalf the WFN regarding a new initiative aimed at facilitating access and dissemination of quality educational neurology content in the form of recurring sessions such as rounds and seminars. The idea is to post links on the WFN website to recurring events that span all of the subspecialties in neurology, along with links to recordings of these events so that the material can be accessed at any time. Access to the educational material would be free of charge.

We are approaching you because you are a leader in your field and are well-positioned to identify individuals who organize recurring educational events at sites within the United States that meet the criteria below and who may be interested in participating in the pilot project.

For the pilot project, the educational activities would ideally meet the following criteria:

- 1. Recurrent and held at least once a month
- 2. Recorded for future viewing
- 3. Accredited by an official body such as a hospital, university, or national specialty society
- 4. Reviewed by the WFN eLearning Working Group for approval

The pilot will run for 6 months and will be followed by a formal evaluation. The WFN will then decide whether to continue and expand the e-Learning initiative.

We appreciate that our request might pose significant challenges in these difficult times. However, we hope that you will be able to collaborate with us on the pilot for this exciting new initiative. Please let us know whether you are interested in working with us on this pilot project by helping us identify site(s) in the Danube region that might like to participate. I am happy to set up a Zoom call to discuss.
